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A Glance at History by Pastor Dan Lyman

Recently in the news there are people who have asserted that empathy is a bad thing. Empathy is a lot like sympathy. Sympathy is when you feel sorry for someone else's misfortune, but empathy goes a little farther toward imagining yourself in their shoes and understanding it better. Empathy is what motivates us to send food relief to starving people (that we do not even know and will never meet) when they are in the grip of a famine, even on the other side of the globe. Empathy is what calls us to action heroically when we arrive at the traffic accident, and we find ourselves pulling people out of burning cars. Empathy helps us care about others.

But there have always been people who are against empathy and its similar virtues of care and kindness. Simply glance at history. The slave masters of Egypt, Greece, Rome, and the American South, often cautioned against treating your slaves too well. And they fantasized about how their slaves needed their masters and could not manage themselves.

Later, the bosses of industry believed the same things about their workers. The "divine right of kings" turned into "social Darwinism," the idea that the rich deserved their riches because they were "fitter" than the poor.

Edward Gibbon in his "Decline and Fall of the Roman Empire" blamed Christianity for the fall of Rome. It weakened the vigorous warlike virtues, he said. He craved the imperial conquests and the enslavement of the conquered. But why did Romans become Christians? Because they lived with the bullying Roman Empire. They knew it was vain and empty and meaningless. They chose, at risk of their lives, when being a Christian could get you killed, they chose the meaningful life following Christ. They chose kindness, empathy, and caring for one another.

The most recent attack on "empathy" postulates something akin to Nazism, that some people are "better" and some people "worse." If we send food and shelter and medicine to the "worse" people, we'll just have more "worse" people. They say it'd be a waste of our resources to send it to them. They assert that we should send our resources to the "better" people. How do we find these "better" people? Fortunately, they are already rich! We simply give rich people more of our resources! Oh happy day!

It is a short step from viewing poor people as worthless, to viewing them as parasites, to calling them vermin to be exterminated, to exterminating them.

The truth is that luck has a lot to do with wealth. Lucky that Bill Gates could hire someone to write the software he would later luckily license to IBM. Lucky that Steve Jobs could take the graphic interface he saw at Xerox and copy it in his computers. Lucky that Netflix did not sell itself to Blockbuster for \$50 million.

And sharp legal dealings have a lot to do with wealth. Like when the Facebook guy cut everybody else out of ownership. Or when rich parents pass wealth to their kids.

But back to empathy. Jesus would want us to be good to each other. Never does he indicate anything like a "better people/worse people" separation. Jesus wants us to care for one another. So if you run into the "empathy is bad" idea, you know what Jesus would say: Matthew 25:31-46, Luke 14:12-14, Luke 16:19-25, 1 John 3:17-18.

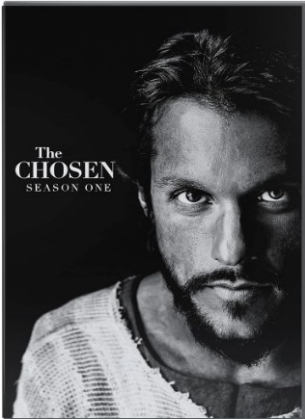

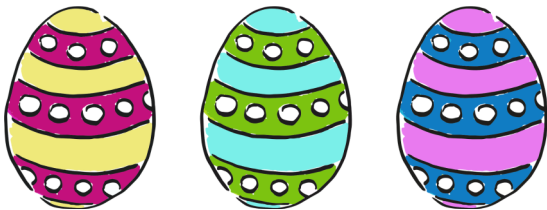

Notes from Pastor Dan



Celebrate Our Heritage

On October 4 2025, our congregation will be 175 years old. We are celebrating with First Lutheran, Manitowoc who was chartered with us. To celebrate, we have several events, the largest of which is our joint celebration on October 12 at 3 pm at The Franciscan Music Center. First Lutheran is also having a hymn sing and organ recital this spring May 18 at 3 pm.

Our spring event is not scheduled yet, but we have 2 ideas we would like to start. First a commemorative cookbook to mark the occasion. If you have any recipes that are 175 years old, we want them. Our lefse recipe and its variations will be in there. But any yummy food is desired. Look for a box in the communication area in the Gathering Space. The other idea is to fill a time capsule. Pastor will be showing the capsule during the announcements. The time capsule will be stored here at church and opened in 25 years at the 200th anniversary of our congregation. Imagine our congregation bicentennial.

Before she died, my mother and I had no conversations about what memorial might be fitting for her. After prayerfully considering several worthy charities I decided that the ELCA "Good Gifts" program would reflect mom's interests best. Good Gifts is like the better known Heifer Project, in that they supply livestock and agriculture education to poor people all over the world so they can work to farm and feed themselves. It matches mom's fondness for animals and her desire to feed people. So my goal is to fully fund a "Family Farm" at Good Gifts, for \$715.00. If that becomes fully funded to then fund a fruit tree farm (an orchard) for \$150.00. And if that becomes fully funded, a fish farm for \$250.00.

Gifts to Faith marked as "Nancy Lyman Memorial" will be sent in to Good Gifts and will be responded with thank you notes.



During Fellowship we commented on the 12 baptisms last year, a good number! But several people said, "Hey I have a grandchild (or a niece or some kin) who has not been baptized yet. I dunno what those kids are waiting for." I suggest, with Spring coming, that you start nagging encouraging them to schedule the baptism and make it happen. They just meet with me in person (after worship) or by phone to learn the meaning of baptism and then we schedule it during a service. Easy.

Find: According to this psalm, what 4 things can you do instead of worrying?

Activity: Choose one action from Psalm 37 to focus on today.

Find: What imagery does the psalmist use to describe his longing for God?

Activity: Write down one way you can draw closer to God when you feel distant.

10 Psalm 46

Find: How does this psalm describe God's protection during times of trouble?

Activity: Spend 5 minutes in silence, meditating on the phrase "Be still and know that I am God."

Activity: Write down one way you can cultivate a heart of worship today.

Find: How does this psalm describe God's abundant provision?

Find: In this psalm, what does David say he will do?

Faith Lutheran Church Minutes—February 17 2025

Housekeeping Items: New council members Loren Ulness, Tanyia Sorenson and Mary Thomsen were introduced and welcomed.

Old Business: Blinds for Fellowship Hall windows—Joan presented the quotes and the council discussed with her the types of blinds and options available, as well as prices. Time was of the essence in order to get a 55% Presidents Day discount. Joan mentioned that a donor is willing to pay up to \$5,000 toward the purchase of blinds. Motion made and carried to buy Levelor double-cell, cordless, non-motorized blinds from Blinds.com, for seven windows and two doors, with the color to be determined after samples have arrived. The cost will be about \$2,500, with no shipping cost and a 10-year warranty. Joan was thanked for her work in getting quotes and information on the blinds.

New Business: Bob Pautz volunteered to do PowerPoints for worship services when Christine is unavailable. Tanyia also offered to help from her home if needed. 175th Anniversary of Founding of Original Three Parishes is this year (March 4, 1850-start of West Church.) First Lutheran in Manitowoc, which later broke off from the original parishes, will have a joint celebration on Oct. 12 at the Franciscan Center for Performing Arts. Faith is being asked to attend the planning meetings.

Council Reports

Stewardship: Bob Pautz. CD was coming due on Feb. 18. Bob suggested rolling it over and was instructed to do that.

Lay Ministry: (Julie Hartman for Jennifer Ott). Committee discussed the Communion hymn sing and will try doing only one verse per song. They also are working on getting candelabra for Advent painted and to use a blue candle. Plans are made for Lenten and Easter services. Handbell repairs will cost about \$1,400 and the account has enough money to cover it.

Evangelism: Julie Hartman. Plans were set for the Chili Cookoff on Feb. 23 and Lenten devotional materials and postcards were planned for Easter.

Fellowship: Marilyn Robley. On March 11, the committee will be serving at the pastor synod lunch. They are looking for hosts for the Lenten soup and sandwich suppers for March 19, 26 and April. She asked where the proceeds of the suppers should go and it was decided to divide the money equally among The Haven, Manitowoc Warming Shelter and Hope House.

Church Properties: Loren Ulness. Spring cleanup plans are being discussed. He made a note to have the east side of the church building checked for possible mold growth on the exterior.

Youth and Family Ministry: Bridget Valleskey asked about a confirmation service project in which diapers will be collected for The Crossing. No council approval is needed for a collection of items. Approval only needed to collect money. Larry noted that Jim Schuessler is working on confirmation curriculum to make sure it's not duplicated or missing anything among the levels. He also said the 9th grade confirmation class has its packets to prepare their faith statements; May 18 is Confirmation Sunday. Confirmation students' parents have been sent information about the visit to the synagogue in Sheboygan on April 5. Tanyia said the Youth & Family is planning a board game night for the congregation on March 28 from 6-8 p.m. Also planning the Easter breakfast, with setup on Saturday and serving on Easter morning.

Security and Tech Support: Bill Riesterer is looking at having outside cameras for added security and plans are being made for a new fire alarm phone system.

Pastor mentioned that it has been 2 years since the parish hired Bridget Valleskey as youth and family coordinator and it was set up as a three year salary. The council needs to decide what to do about the position. Pastor commended Bridget for her work and said he supports having her salary placed into the regular church budget.
