This is the Day

"Out of my distress I called on the Lord" (Psalm 118:5).

We are a nation in distress. We are a church in distress. The coronavirus has killed 103,000 of us. The virus of racism has taken hundreds of thousands more throughout our history. Now these two deadly viruses converge. Under this distress the veneer of equality has cracked and we see the pain, anger and frustration of those who have been denied the rights and dignity so many of us expect and often take for granted.

I have heard it said that slavery ended with the Civil War. Why don't people of color "just get over it." Here is the question we need to ask, "How do you get over something that isn't over?" The extrajudicial killings of Ahmaud Arbery, Breonna Taylor and George Floyd that we have seen have laid open the wound in our country that has never been fully dealt with and has never healed. The officer's knee suffocating the life out of George Floyd "reminds us that blatant acts of intimidation, hatred, and violence continue" (*Freed in Christ* social statement, page 3).

Continued peaceful protests, vigils and demonstrations are not only legitimate but essential to move this country and this church to honest and deep self-examination. Just as the body of Christ is COVID positive, so is the body of Christ infected with racism and white supremacy. We cannot turn away from this truth. To deny it is dishonest and dangerous.

Let us stand with those peacefully protesting and acting responsibly. Looting and destruction of property does not further the cause of justice. Government has a role to uphold civil order while also a role to respect peaceful protest. There are those in law enforcement who are acting wisely, even while others have acted irresponsibly. I ask you to support the many people, including those in our church, who are working to de-escalate tensions between law enforcement, protesters and the community.

Psalm 118 continues: "I thank you that you have answered me and have become my salvation. The stone that the builders rejected has become the chief cornerstone. This is the Lord's doing; it is marvelous in our eyes. This is the day that the Lord has made; let us rejoice and be glad in it" (21-24). Christ, the cornerstone, has already broken down the wall that divides us. The time is now. This is the day.

Faith Lutheran Church Minute Highlights—May 18, 2020

Call to Order: The meeting was called to order by President Bill Riesterer at 6:35 pm. Note: This meeting is being held yet within the restricted period of Covid-19; with slow relaxation on restrictions beginning, some members of the Council are present online from home, some are at the church maintaining guideline distances.

<u>Pastor's Report:</u> He indicated he would be meeting with the individual boards as to how we can successfully begin to move forward with ministries. Pastor had attended Zoom Synod meetings regarding camp and how to proceed with ministries in the future. There will be no Confirmation Camp. Pastor had the Schuh funeral on April 22 at Chilton Funeral Home. He will take vacation on June 14-21 and will work around worship for that time.

NEW BUSINESS:

Return to Sunday in-house services. Now that restrictions have begun to relax, members discussed when and how services here at the church could resume. Various ideas were discussed, including: to open with outdoor services and the Praise Band or some musicians, to follow synod recommendations: to open but with many restrictions, to open as "come at your own risk." We'll begin slowly, aiming at a target date no sooner than June 28, if things are ready. Lay Ministry will work on this, possibly getting an outdoor service with the praise band organized. It was decided by motion to continue Virtual Services (you tube and cable).

CARES Act – Loan Grant update: Payroll advance authorized by Executive Board: Don Domrath explained details of this act which gives financial help to businesses (for which the church qualified)- we received a Loan on April 15 with 75% to be used for Salary and 25% to be used for Utilities and Mortgage Interest, to be used by June 15. We also got help in the form of a Disaster Loan.

Revisit March Council action reference events. In reference to the March Council meeting motion that all boards have the authority to cancel an event, the question came up as to the definition of an event vs. a program. The council members were asked to bring back to the June meeting a list of events or programs that they think should require the authority of the Church Council to be cancelled.

Recognition for Joyce Loritz: The family of Joyce Loritz asked permission of the council to have a plaque placed in the library displaying a picture of Joyce and recognition of her many years of service to the library. Motion made and carried.

Evangelism: Our new Web Site is up and running, a great new updated page at the same old address.

<u>Fellowship</u>: The Brat Fry for Saturday, June 6, has been cancelled. Cheryl will make Soup for Souls. Quilters may re-start Thursday, June 4, with the guidelines that they wear a mask, practice social distancing, sign a waiver.

Property: Outdoor lawn work is being done, with fertilizing finishing in June. The pastor's office has been painted.

Christian Education: VBS has been cancelled. Cards have been sent out to the Sunday School students.

Youth and Family Ministry: There will be a picture of Flat Pastor on Facebook and Faith Lutheran's website beginning on June 7. This will be similar to Flat Jesus and Flat Martin Luther in the past, where this year Flat Pastor is found doing something concerning Creation.

<u>Personnel Committee</u>: Kelly Meyer job description/contract: Bill will be talking to Kelly Meyer to find out about the possibility of a contract with him, if he is willing to continue his online work after church services resume. He will let the council know at our June meeting after his discussion.

<u>Call Committee:</u> Bill spoke with Pastor Amy Engebose from the synod office concerning whether anyone has shown interest in our vacancy. He was told 3 people looked at the MSP but they have not pursued. The reasons given had nothing to do with us or that the MSP didn't look good, merely an existence of family preferences in which it did not work out for them.
