Bible Study Restarts!

I was just looking at starting up my Bible Study class again after our summer break. We will restart on September 16th. We have read through and studied quite a bit of the Bible already, but new members of the class are welcome. We have read the history books up to the time Judea was conquered and carried off into slavery in Babylon. So that is where we will pick up.

It was at this time that the Jews lost the Hebrew language and they began to speak the language of the Babylonian Empire. The scholars of modern times call the language Aramaic, but in their own era they called it "Syrian" or "Chaldean."

Before the Babylonian conquest, the Jews were more focused on worship at the Temple, but after the Babylonians destroyed the Temple, they became "people of the book," who could worship God anywhere, and take their portable scriptures wherever they needed to go. It was at this time that they put the final edit on the Books of Moses and began gathering the official books that would become our Old Testament.

As they were figuring out what should be sacred scriptures, time was passing and more history was happening. In 332 BC, Alexander the Great conquered everybody worth conquering, and so all literate people began speaking and writing in Greek. The Jews found themselves with books they liked that had never been written in Hebrew. Some had been Aramaic and then translated into Greek. Others were simply composed and written down in Greek. But they wanted all their REALLY sacred scriptures to be in the sacred Hebrew language right from the start. So they set the Greek language books aside and only sanctified the Hebrew ones. But they kept the other ones. We still have them, but we keep them separate. Some Bibles print them in what is called the Apocrypha.

We will start with the books of the Apocrypha in our Bible Study since they come from the time of the Babylonian Exile and the Persian restoration. Interesting stuff.

As I said, all are welcome.




September Stewardship

This day is an opportunity to celebrate who we are as the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America — one church, freed in Christ to serve and love our neighbor.

Service activities offer an opportunity for us to explore one of our most basic convictions as Lutherans: that all of life in Jesus Christ – every act of service, in every daily calling, in every corner of life – flows freely from a living, daring confidence in God's grace.

A hymn titled "God's Work, Our Hands," written by Wayne Wold, was selected as the winning entry in the ELCA's "God's work. Our hands." Sunday hymn contest in 2019. More than 120 entries were submitted to be considered as a hymn for the ELCA's annual dedicated day of service. The selected hymn represents the official tagline of the ELCA and expresses how the people of this church live in service for the life of the world. We offer our thanks to all who submitted original compositions — the large number of entries gives witness to the enthusiasm that "God's work. Our hands." Sunday has inspired throughout this church and in our communities.

On this day we will come together to help others in our community. We have the following projects for you to choose from: washing church windows, LWR kit packing, Soup for the Souls, yard clean up, Random Acts of Kindness, fleece blankets, highway cleanup, any other projects? We will start right after service and conclude with a light lunch. Please see the sign-up sheet in the Gathering Space.

Faith Lutheran Church Minutes—July 21, 2025

Guest's Topic of discussion: Devin was present to speak about the organ and the future of music at Faith Lutheran. Sue Riesterer also was present. Devin said that the type of digital organ Faith has is known to fail eventually, noting that it is about 10 years old. He wants to be ready when we need to replace the organ, whenever that happens. He asked about starting an organ fund to save for the future purchase of a new organ. He suggested thinking about installing a pipe organ and presented some ideas and pictures from organ builders as examples of how it could fit in the sanctuary. The concept would be to put the organ pipes in the altar and suggested several ideas for raising funds, such as church carnivals, sponsorships of organ pipes and contests. He also said a pipe organ would be the centerpiece of the sanctuary and would last forever and could bring in a new community to Faith. He wants people to think it through for the future so the church is well prepared, although the need won't come for many years. Even without a pipe organ, he asked for a fund to be created for the eventual replacement and ongoing maintenance of the organ. In rough numbers: a new digital organ like the current one would cost about \$87,000 today. A pipe organ would cost \$600,000 to \$1 million, depending on options and models. Discussion followed. Pastor Dan noted it may be possible to buy an organ from a church that is closing and have it built to fit our space, and Devin agreed that is possible. Pastor suggested that the fund not be designated as only an organ fund so it could be used for other things if needed. Bob: Would need to raise \$30,000-\$50,000 a year for a new one, so maybe used is a better idea. Devin said the music ministry at Faith is going through changes to bring back the feeling of music, rather than just hearing it. Joan said maybe this is the challenge we need, and it should be done with congregational approval so we have money for an upgrade even if a pipe organ is not chosen. Sue noted she will be cutting back substantially from playing organ and that Devin is well qualified to be the main organist. Devin said it will be impossible to replace everything she does.

Pastor's Report: Pastor Dan noted the church had good coverage for worship during his vacation. He said Vacation Bible School had 61 children, assisted by 13 high school students, 15 adults and help from many members and friends. In the previous month, Rex William Valleskey was baptized, and his mother, Ricki Valleskey, also joined the congregation, along with her parents, Rick and Carmen Pankratz, and sister, Allison Pankratz. Molly May Miller was scheduled to be baptized on July 27. Pastor also led worship and communion at Angelus Senior Living on July 16, attended by Faith members Ron and Connie Torrison and seven other residents, and Sue Riesterer played the organ. He also visited Bob Argall at the Wisconsin Veterans Home at King and is doing well.

Old Business: Onkka bench: Loren-Valders Stone and Marble estimates a September delivery date at the earliest. The board of church properties has the spot picked out and decided to use landscape blocks and not cement as a base. Bridget—Heart-a-Rama plans to give an AED to Faith soon.

New Business: Motion made and carried to rename the current organ fund as the Future Music Fund.

Council representative reports

Treasurer's Report: Bob-expenses are up but donations are about the same. Attendance averaged 141 weekly. Stewardship: Joan-The board is looking for people willing to speak at services about time, talent and treasure over a three-week period. She will take names and contact those who express interest.

Fellowship: Marilyn-The board is planning a senior appreciation and quilters appreciation day on September 10. She asked that it be noted in the bulletin that there will be no fellowship time on August 17 and encouraged people to attend the multi-church event in Manitowoc that day.

Church Properties: Loren-They are looking for ideas for projects for God's work. Our hands. such as cleaning up bushes and trees. He noted that cleaning the exterior stones on the church is difficult to avoid ruining them and he will check into the cost of having it done professionally. He also acknowledged a notice from WPS about energy costs increasing on budget billing.

Christian Education: Bridget-They will stay with the same Sunday School curriculum. She said the board has been discussing ways to share information with the Board of Youth and Family and invited that board to come to the education board meetings quarterly. She noted that Jim Schuessler will mentor her to prepare for the ELCA National Youth Gathering for the next two years for fund raising, planning etc. Next gathering is in 2027 in Minnesota.


